Dear Families

Although there have been relatively few school days since our last newsletter, the twenty which there have been, have been absolutely jam packed with opportunities to support and enhance our provision for pupils, from manipulating numbers to internet safety and dance floor moves!

January closed with a whole school Number Day and a focus on mathematics, ensuring that our pupils have a real appreciation of the value of strong number skills and how these underpin so many aspects of life. Thank you to everyone who supported both in joining us in school to talk to the children about the role maths has in their workplace but also to everyone who supported in enabling an array of wonderful costumes.

Moving into February our Year 5 pupils have had the opportunity to consider their road safety skills through the Bikeability programme, which looks at how to assess the road worthiness of equipment as well as skills on the playground and road. Well done to all our pupils who achieved their awards.

Returning from half term, Miss Hilson organised a whole school internet safety day including workshops and assemblies to support pupils in keeping themselves safe online and why age restrictions are in place. I am sure we would all agree that this is an exceptionally important area for pupils particularly in a fast-moving cyber world.

February has also been the month for an exciting new initiative, our partnership with Godswell Park. This partnership enables us to visit Godswell once a month with a small group of pupils to provide a positive, multi-generational experience. Our first visit last week, saw some of our Year 5 pupils join residents to play board games, chat and colour. The children were so excited and full of anticipation as they boarded the Godswell minibus and once at Godswell had a wonderful afternoon. We are looking forward to a mutually beneficial partnership moving forward, with the next visit taking place at the end of March, when a larger group of pupils will share their Easter performance.

February has also been an opportunity for our pupils to showcase their dance moves at our discos and my thanks to FoBPS and staff who gave up their time to provide this opportunity. We are exceptionally fortunate at Bloxham to be able to provide a wide range of opportunities beyond the school day and it is sometimes too easily forgotten that these are only possible because staff forgo their unpaid time with their own children and families to provide these opportunities.

Finally since our last newsletter there have been opportunities for you as families to join us for parents consultation evenings, the 1L and 4A learning assemblies and the Spring Open Classrooms. The children really do enjoy being able to share their learning experiences with you in this way and we hope that these continue to provide you with valuable and enjoyable

Assessment.

What we believe at Bloxham - "Assessment should always improve learning not prove learning" Graeme Logan HMI

Assessment is at the heart of children's learning and our teaching. This helps us build up a picture of your child's progress and achievement and also to identify their next steps in learning. We have high expectations for your child to achieve and value each and every one of them.

There are two types of assessment; formative which occurs during teaching and summative which makes judgements about children's performance.

At Bloxham C of E Primary School we have the following summative assessments

- Foundation Stage: Reception Baseline Assessment. Phonics assessments 6x year
- Year 1: phonic screening. Phonics assessments 6x year
- Year 2: Optional SATs
- Year 4: Multiplication check
- Year 1 6 end of term assessments 3 x year
- Year 6: Compulsory SATs

Children are assessed continuously during lessons to help them move on with their learning. A glimpse into our classrooms shows examples of formative assessment, ongoing assessment through questioning, observation and dialogue, children indicating the answer using fingers, whiteboards, using learning partners to discuss questions,



teachers giving feedback when walking round the classroom and explaining any misconceptions and marking of books.

Very thorough systems are put into place at Bloxham Primary School so no child can slip through the net.

Teachers meet 3x a year with the DHT to discuss the learning of each child in their class.

Each child is tracked so we can check they are where they should be to achieve end of year targets. It allows us to notice if a child is falling behind so we can put in place support to enable them to succeed.

Teachers meet with the Inclusion Manager (SENCO) 3x a year to discuss the learning of SEND children.

PUPIL ATTAINMENT

Pupil attainment is reported to you as parents/carers 3 x a year in terms of **emerging**, **expected** and **exceeding** according to national age-related expectations.

Emerging: This is given to a child who is working towards the expected standard for their year group

Expected: This is given to a child who has met the expected standard for their year group

Exceeding: This is given to a child who has exceeded the expected standard for their year group

Social Media

Social media has transformed the way that we communicate with one another. Whilst there are many advantages to our faster, more connected world, as we all know, communicating digitally can sometimes lead to misunderstandings and miscommunications. Safeguarding

A reminder that we do not permit pupils to wear or bring smart watches capable of accessing the internet and/or capturing images to school. Older pupils walking home alone may bring a mobile phone, but this must be handed in at the office each day and a parental consent form completed. Pupils should not bring internet enabled devices or those capable of capturing images to any school/FoBPS event.

Threads

As many parents and carers will already be aware, the school uses its website and Threads account to publicise and showcase the learning and wide-ranging experiences on offer to



pupils. We know from feedback that many of you as parents, grandparents and other carers, enjoy the opportunities these platforms offer to stay connected with the experiences of your child(ren), however we have recently received feedback that a small number of parents were unaware that our Threads account is a public account. Please be aware that both the school's Threads account and website are accessible to the public. Images of pupils will only be posted with parental consent. Where an image captures a child's individual achievement, their first name may be published alongside their image. Full names or other personal data will not be used. The school will seek consent for processing such data at the start of every school year, if during the intervening period you wish to change either granted or declined permissions, please contact the school office in writing.


PE News from Outside the school:

Foundation Stage

We have begun our new learning experience for this term, Ready Steady Grow by exploring the traditional tale, Jack and the Beanstalk and Jasper's Beanstalk by Nick Butterworth. The children received a letter from a very upset Mrs Giant who wanted some help making 'Wanted' posters to help her find the thief who had broken into her cloud-top castle. The children also learned about what Jack's magic beans needed to be able to grow and used their incredible imaginations to draw their own magic beans and dream up what they would like them to grow into. In Maths, we have been learning about measure, looking first at length and height and



then using balance scales to explore weight and predict which objects we thought would be heavier – lots of lovely opportunities to use their developing reasoning skills here!



Year 1

Year 1 have been working hard on their number bond knowledge within 20. We have become pattern spotters using cubes and counters to help us see related number facts. Some of us are getting incredibly quick at recalling our facts now. Keep practising year 1!





Year 2

Year 2 have worked incredibly hard during Maths, learning about multiplication and division. The children have been applying their knowledge to represent multiplication sentences by using resources and creating pictural representations.

In English the children have been learning about information texts and their features, before progressing into creating their own information text all about plants/trees which links to our Topic theme of learning. To full immerse themselves in the topic, the children have also created daffodil theme artwork and have visited the local nature reserve, The Slade.







Year 3

We have been exploring measurements in Mathematics. We went outside to measure the heights, lengths and widths of various objects and structures in metres and centimetres. We have also been enjoying our topic of "Rocks Relics and Rumbles", recently we thought about how earthquakes are caused by tectonic plates rubbing against each other, building friction and creating vibrations – we modelled this using sandpaper and other materials that we rubbed together!





Year 4

Both classes have been learning about a traditional tale 'Little Red Riding Hood' in French, Le Petit Chaperon Rouge. They read and understood the story and 4A bravely performed a play entirely in French to KS2. Oh, là, là! They were confident with their spoken parts and I'm sure they inspired other children to use their French knowledge to participate in a performance in the future.

Year 5

Last Friday Year 5 have been hard at work designing and building their own Nowhere Emporia based on the book by Ross MacKenzie. We are using these to inspire our extended descriptive narrative writing. The Children needed to work out what materials they needed as well as how to recreate their imaginative ideas in cardboard!





Year 6

In Year 6, we have been developing our knowledge of electricity and components by experimenting with circuits. We have linked our science knowledge to our Computing topic of 'Programming' and had great fun using the Micro:Bits. Micro:Bits are small programmable devices that are designed to make coding fun and engaging.

In RE, we have embarked on a new 'Big Question': Is Christianity still a strong religion 2000 years after Jesus was born on Earth? We will be considering the charities who help people and the religious festivals across the world that illustrate the strength of Christian belief. Festivals such as; Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, Mothering Sunday, Palm Sunday and Holy week running up to Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. Come and have a chat with us about it.
